Bringing together our work in the cities of East Africa: For a long time we (Ian, Collin, Prosper, Silver and Alex) have been making regular trips to Bujumbura in Burundi, exploring ways how to work with youth there, support the young church and start something that will connect youth workers across the city and the denominations.

3 years down the road there is now a strong, growing youth workers network called DOMEKA, that brings over 200 youth workers together from different churches in Bujumbura. They meet once a month and have already organized a big youth conference.

Back in Kampala our local network is now meeting regularly every last Wednesday of the month bringing together youth pastors/workers from 10 churches across the city.

In October we hosted 3 founder leaders from NAYNET (in Nairobi) here in Kampala and had a good time discussing ways of engaging and partnering more together in youth ministry in Nairobi as well as across the East African cities.



In Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, there is a network ready to take off. I have been down there twice in the past year. They are about to organize a meeting for youth pastors/workers in key churches in Dar next February.

We, along with NAYNET, have a vision to bring together the key leaders from the 4 cities for an EACWYN meeting (East African City Wide Youth Workers Network) in 2012, as well as support the continued growth of the individual networks.

In December and January YEA will be doing more training there and helping to facilitate a Youth Convention in Masindi.

All our other work across the country is moving forward and we have potential new partners in Fort Portal, Bushenyi and Iganga.

Friendship with key people in Kampala, David Kabiswa, Amos Wekesa and Leonard Mutesasira, are opening up exciting new possibilities for the future.

May the good Lord see His work grow to even greater heights in the year ahead through YEA.
